Requirements of Confirmation Candidates

The Confirmation process is a two-year process. This begins with 7th grade and continues through 8th and up to the time of Confirmation. Below are the expectations and requirements for Confirmation:

- * The candidate **MUST** be a practicing Catholic who attends Mass and receives Communion on a regular basis. If you are not attending Mass, your Confirmation will likely be deferred for failing to follow the most basic of Catholic teachings. This requirement is closely monitored over the course of the calendar year. Use student envelopes each time you attend Mass. Under NO circumstances are students or parents to submit another student's envelope at Mass.

- *Religious Education Classes* – Candidates are expected to attend classes once a week, adhere to the attendance policy already in place and successfully complete the 7th grade curriculum. Students are expected to conduct themselves appropriately.
- *Parents are expected to take an active role in their child's preparation for Confirmation. This includes, but is not limited to, attending the Parent/Student Retreat which will be scheduled during the school year.*
- *Students are expected to participate in all activities related to Confirmation preparation which may include the Enrollment Mass, group service projects, retreats, etc.*
- *The completion and submission of this booklet by the date due.*

The Role and Eligibility of the Sponsor

Individual sponsors must be selected and should be decided upon without delay. A sponsor must be a person who knows the candidate and can help him/her on his/her spiritual journey and can share his/her own faith. This selection should take place at the beginning of Confirmation preparation as it often takes time for a sponsor to receive eligibility papers from his/her home parish. In fact, this process can easily take months if the sponsor is not known in his/her parish or in most cases not registered in a Catholic Church at all.

Sponsor Eligibility:

- * Must be at least 16 years old.
- * Must be a Catholic who has received all three Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Eucharist, Confirmation).
- * May be male or female for either gender candidate.
- * Cannot be a biological parent but may be a stepparent or grandparent.
- * Must meet the eligibility requirements of his/her own parish.
- * Must meet the eligibility requirements of the Catholic Church including "valid marriage" status. (see below)

Once you have chosen a sponsor, he/she must go to HIS/HER parish and request a Sponsor Eligibility Certificate. Once they have that, they should give it to you to attach to your booklet (see "Attachment" page)

****Booklets will not be accepted as complete without the Sponsor Eligibility Certificate.***

*****A valid sacramental marriage means that if a person was married in a Catholic Church, he/she cannot be divorced and remarried unless the first marriage was annulled. For more information on whether or not someone qualifies, please speak to our staff.***

Confirmation Fees and 8th Grade

The tuition for Confirmation is \$100.00. This covers the re-registration fee in total. There are no additional costs for retreats or Confirmation robes or materials. This fee should be submitted with this booklet (see Attachment page) unless other financial arrangements have been made.

Students will be measured for their Confirmation robes in January of their 8th grade year. These robes are rented not purchased.

The Good Samaritan

In the parable of the Good Samaritan, Jesus tells the story of a man who is beaten and left for dead on the side of the road. A priest and a Levite, both respected figures in their community, see the injured man but pass by without offering help. It is a Samaritan—a person from a group despised by the Jewish audience Jesus was speaking to—who stops, tends to the man's wounds, and ensures his recovery by taking him to an inn and paying for his care. The Samaritan's actions demonstrate selfless love and compassion, transcending cultural boundaries and personal inconvenience. Jesus uses this story to teach us that loving our neighbor requires action and sacrifice, even when it disrupts our plans or challenges our biases.

In today's world, we might encounter a similar situation when we see someone experiencing homelessness on the street. Many of us might feel conflicted. We might avoid eye contact or cross to the other side of the road, thinking we're too busy or that someone else will help. Sometimes, our internal struggles—whether financial worries, a busy schedule, or even discomfort with the person's appearance—can hold us back from stepping in. Yet, being a modern "Good Samaritan" could be as simple as offering food, taking a moment to ask how they're doing, or even supporting local charities that provide long-term assistance. The act of kindness doesn't always have to be grand; it just requires willingness.

Often, what prevents us from acting is our own preoccupation with our problems. We may think, “I’m already stretched thin” or “I don’t have the time.” Yet the parable reminds us that compassion isn't convenient; it requires a heart ready to prioritize another’s needs over our own comfort. By choosing to act despite our hesitations, we become witnesses to the transformative power of love and mercy, just as the Good Samaritan was. The challenge lies not in the magnitude of the help we offer but in overcoming the barriers within ourselves to give it.

When we are Baptized, usually as babies, our parents and godparents take on the baptismal promises on our behalf. When we are Confirmed, we are renewing those promises and taking them on ourselves. We are all called to "bear witness to the Christian faith in words and deeds" - this means that what we do and what we say must reflect that we are following Jesus. In preparing for Confirmation, you will be asked to do something which is a purposeful example of what it is to follow Jesus.

Corporal Works of Mercy - Examples

- **Feed the Hungry**
 - Pack lunches or snack bags for a local food pantry or homeless shelter.
- **Give Drink to the Thirsty**
 - Donate water bottles to a shelter or outreach program.
- **Clothe the Naked**
 - Collect gently used clothes and donate them to a local charity or thrift store.
- **Visit the Sick**
 - Make handmade cards for hospital patients or homebound parishioners.
- **Shelter the Homeless**
 - Help put together hygiene kits for shelters.
- **Visit the Imprisoned**
 - Write letters or make cards for prison ministry programs.
- **Bury the Dead**
 - Help clean up a cemetery or decorate graves with flowers.

Spiritual Works of Mercy - Examples

- **Instruct the Ignorant**
 - Help teach a religious education class or assist with Vacation Bible School.
- **Counsel the Doubtful**
 - Write a letter of encouragement for someone going through a difficult time, such as a friend, family member, or someone in the parish.
- **Admonish the Sinner**
 - Create a positive, respectful social media post or flyer about making good choices, standing up for others, or living out faith values. (For credit save the post and show it along with reactions.)
- **Comfort the Sorrowful**
 - Make a care package or craft to cheer up someone grieving or struggling.
- **Forgive Offenses Willingly**
 - Write a letter of apology to someone the student has hurt, or verbally reconcile with someone they've had conflict with.
- **Bear Wrongs Patiently**
 - Assist with a challenging chore or task at home or in the community without complaint, even if the task is unpleasant.
- **Pray for the Living and the Dead**
 - Complete a 9-day Novena and pray the chaplet of divine mercy each day for someone in need. (Divine Mercy Chaplet is on APP Store and Google Play).
